At Hope For Literacy, our vision is simple yet urgent:



A Pencil With a Purpose

Hope For Literacy's partnership with MOMO Pencils is at the heart of our sustainability model.

MOMO Pencils are made from 100% recycled newspapers, eliminating the need for wood and reducing environmental degradation. For every pencil distributed, we protect forests while enabling learning.

This partnership ensures:

- No tree is cut to make a pencil
- Children receive durable, affordable stationery
- Schools engage with environmental education
- Sustainability is embedded in literacy delivery

Education should never come at the cost of the environment — and with MOMO Pencils, it doesn't.



LITERACY ACCESS ACROSS KENYA

Reaching Underserved Communities

Hope For Literacy focuses on schools where families face economic hardship and limited access to learning materials. By working directly with school leadership and community members, we ensure that support reaches those who need it most.

Our approach is community-driven:

- Schools identify priority needs
- Teachers guide distribution
- Children receive tools without stigma
- Communities participate in sustainability efforts

STORY FROM CLASSROOM



Every child deserves access to quality education, starting with the tools to learn.

Before receiving her first set of pencils, Amina often shared materials with classmates or sat quietly during lessons. Writing was slow, and confidence was low. Today, Amina participates actively. She completes assignments, practices writing at home, and proudly carries her own pencil case to school.

Her story is one of many quiet transformations that remind us that literacy begins with access.

SUSTAINABILITY AT THE HEART OF LITERACY



Literacy That Protects the Planet

At Hope For Literacy, education and environmental responsibility are inseparable. Across Kenya, deforestation and climate change directly affect children's lives, from food security to school attendance. That reality shaped our decision to embed sustainability at the core of our literacy model.

Traditional pencils rely on timber. MOMO Pencils disrupt this cycle by producing high-quality pencils from recycled newspapers, ensuring that learning does not come at the cost of forests. Every pencil distributed is a statement: education can be both accessible and responsible.

This approach allows children not only to learn how to write, but also to understand the value of conservation and resource stewardship

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT IN ACTION



From Classrooms to Climate Awareness

Through our literacy distributions, children are introduced to the idea that everyday objects have environmental consequences. Teachers incorporate sustainability discussions into lessons, linking literacy with broader life skills.

Key environmental outcomes this year include:

- Reduced demand for wood-based stationery
- Increased awareness of recycling and reuse
- School-based discussions on climate responsibility
- Tree planting linked to school partnerships

This integrated approach ensures that children grow up seeing sustainability not as a separate concept, but as part of daily life and learning.

TREE PLANTING & LONG-TERM IMPACT



Growing Futures, One Tree at a Time

Growing Futures, One Tree at a Time

As part of the Hope For Literacy model, each partner school receives 100 fruit seedlings to plant within the school compound. These fruit trees serve multiple purposes:

- Environmental restoration
- Shade and improved learning spaces
- Long-term food security (fruit trees)
- Practical learning tools for agriculture and science

Tree planting reinforces the idea that education is an investment — not just in minds, but in the future health of communities.



TEACHERS AT THE CENTER OF CHANGE

Empowering Educators

Teachers are often the unsung heroes of literacy. Many work in under-resourced environments, improvising materials and supporting large class sizes with limited tools.

By ensuring every child has access to basic stationery, Hope For Literacy directly supports teachers' ability to teach effectively. Lessons flow more smoothly, participation increases, and teachers spend less time managing scarcity and more time focusing on learning outcomes.

Teachers report:

- Improved classroom engagement
- Reduced absenteeism
- Increased confidence among learners
- More consistent lesson completion

VOICES FROM THE CLASSROOM (TEACHER PERSPECTIVE)



"When every child has a pencil, the classroom changes. There is less shame, more confidence, and learning becomes equal."

Teachers consistently highlight how access to stationery transforms not only academic performance, but also classroom dynamics. Children who once stayed silent now participate. Group work becomes inclusive. Confidence grows. These changes may seem small, but they form the foundation for long-term educational success.

COUNTY-LEVEL IMPACT: REACHING COMMUNITIES

Focused, Community-Driven Distribution



Hope For Literacy works closely with school leadership to identify priority areas. Rather than a one-size-fits-all approach, each distribution is informed by local context, enrolment levels, economic challenges, and existing resources.

By partnering directly with schools, we ensure:

- Transparency in distribution
- Accountability at the community level
- Local ownership of impact
- Sustainable follow-up

This localized model strengthens trust and ensures that literacy support reaches children who need it most.

CASE STUDY: A SCHOOL TRANSFORMED


A Shared Starting Line

At a public primary school in a semi-arid region of Kenya, teachers reported that more than half of learners regularly attended class without writing materials.

Following a Hope For Literacy distribution:

- Participation in lessons increased
- Homework completion improved
- Teachers reported higher morale
- Learners expressed pride in their materials

One head teacher shared that for the first time, all learners began lessons on an equal footing, no borrowing, no exclusion.

SEE THE CHILD: LITERACY THROUGH A CHILD'S EYES

More Than Materials

At the heart of Hope For Literacy is a simple but powerful belief: **when you see the child, the solution becomes clear.** For many learners, the absence of basic stationery quietly reinforces inequality. Children who lack pencils often withdraw, not because they lack ability, but because they lack tools.

By addressing this gap, Hope For Literacy removes a barrier that too often goes unseen.

Each pencil distributed is an invitation: your voice matters, your work matters, and you belong in this classroom.

A CHILD'S STORY: FINDING CONFIDENCE

Case Study: Samuel




"Now I don't have to wait. I can write like everyone else."

Samuel attends a public primary school where his class size exceeds 50 pupils. Before the Hope For Literacy distribution, Samuel regularly borrowed pencils or waited for others to finish before attempting his work.

When Samuel received his own set of MOMO Pencils, his teacher noticed immediate change. He began completing assignments independently, volunteering to read aloud, and taking pride in his schoolwork.

Samuel's story reflects a broader truth: access unlocks confidence, and confidence unlocks learning.



GENDER & LITERACY: KEEPING GIRLS ENGAGED

Addressing Hidden Barriers

Girls in underserved communities face compounded challenges in accessing education. Beyond poverty, social expectations and resource scarcity often limit consistent participation.

Hope For Literacy recognizes that **equitable access to learning tools is a gender issue**. When girls lack materials, they are more likely to disengage, miss lessons, or fall behind.

By ensuring equal access to stationery:

- Girls participate more confidently
- Classroom equality is reinforced
- Drop-off rates reduce
- Self-esteem increases

Education is one of the most powerful tools for gender equity — and literacy is where it begins.

Local Solutions, Global Thinking



MOMO Pencils represents innovation born in Kenya, responding to local needs with global relevance.

By transforming recycled newspapers into durable writing tools, MOMO Pencils:

- Reduces waste
- Eliminates reliance on timber
- Creates local employment
- Keeps costs accessible


This innovation ensures that Hope For Literacy is not dependent on imports, but instead strengthens local manufacturing ecosystems while delivering impact.

FROM NEWSPAPER TO A PENCIL

The Journey of a Pencil

Stage 1

We start by selecting and cutting old newspapers into the desired size.



Stage 2

After cutting newspapers, we insert graphite in the middle of the cut newspapers and stick the graphite with glue



FROM NEWSPAPER TO A PENCIL

The Journey of a Pencil

Stage 3

The cut newspapers with graphite inserted are then put through a machine that rolls them into a cylindrical shape



Stage 4

After the newspapers are rolled into the required shape, they are then sun-dried for up to 3 days.



Stage 5

The dried pencils are now polished to attain a smooth outer finish.




Stage 6

At this stage we put a printed film onto the barrel of the pencil.



Stage 7

The pencil with the printed film is then put through a heat shrinking machine, and the film shrinks to the shape of the pencil.



The Journey of a Pencil -cont'd

Stage 8

The pencils are then sharpened using a machine or by hand.



Stage 9

Finally, the pencils are packed. Each pack holds 12 pencils

- Stronger local partnerships


This year demonstrated that scalable impact does not require complexity — it requires clarity, collaboration, and commitment.

- Clear impact tracking


Donors can be confident that their support delivers tangible, measurable outcomes in classrooms across Kenya.
